# MINUTES OF THE NOVEMBER 14, 2023 MEETING OF THE ALBUQUERQUE ARCHAEOLOGICAL SOCIETY

President Ann Braswell called the meeting to order at 7:33 p.m. She welcomed new members and guests.

**MINUTES:** Minutes for the October 2023 meeting were approved as published in the newsletter.

#### TREASURER'S REPORT

Income for the past month was \$65 from memberships (one paying renewal and one new) and \$170 from the Lion Mountain field trip. Operating expenses for the month were the \$16.77 Zoom license fee, \$35.26 for newsletter copying, \$78.79 for new checks, and a \$100 speaker's travel reimbursement.

Program expenses for the two \$1,000 donations to the Archaeological Conservancy for the Tijeras Canyon Site and Sagradis Jardin de Piedra will be reflected in next month's Treasurer's report because those checks were presented to our bank in November.

The checking account balance is \$6,947.89. The money market account earned \$14.81 for the month and the account balance is \$17,537.81.

Newsletter – Helen Crotty: No report.

Maxwell Collections (Lab) – Karen Armstrong: As Karen was unable to attend, her report was read by Mary Raje: "The Crew has been dealing with numerous small collections lately, just a couple of boxes of artifacts per site and multiple sites per work session. It is confusing keeping the sites properly noted, but we're good at that!

"We recently dealt with several boxes from Gallina area. This week we will be processing three or more boxes from an Alaska project! We previously dealt with a very large collection from a site called Walakpa dug by the late Dennis Stanford. These new boxes are from a site also dug by Dennis Stanford before Walakpa. Whale bones instead of potsherds!

"As always, all are welcome to participate in the Wednesday morning Maxwell Crew work."

**Rock Art – Carol Chamberland:** Four government agencies are conflicting each other about allowing us access to the petroglyph sites we were recording. The BLM is not involved. Bottom line: rock art recording is on hold until March.

Sherry Kircher has agreed to help me organize seminars at the Maxwell. We hope to resume the seminars sometime in the first quarter of 2024.

Pottery Southwest – Hayward Franklin: Work has begun on the next edition.

Field Trips – Pat Harris: No report.

**Webmaster – Dick Harris:** The AAS YouTube channel is live. There are two active playlists, Trips and Petroglyphs, with a few videos in each.

#### **SPEAKER**

Vice President Bob Hitchcock introduced Alan J. Osborn, Associate Professor of Sociology and Anthropology at the University of Nebraska – Omaha. He is also the Curator of Anthropology at the Nebraska State Museum and he is the Director of the Nebraska Archaeological Survey. Dr. Osborn spoke on the challenges in cooking at the high altitudes of the Colorado Plateau, which required increased use of scarce fuelwood. Ancestral Pueblo women met these challenges in part by making more intensive use of retained heat cooking technology involving the use of corrugated cooking pots.
